eading in with some numbers this week, US Border Patrol and Homeland Security confirm that since Donald Trump has become president the number of illegal aliens attempting to cross the border has dropped by 40% and the number of arrests of those who do make it across is way up.

To most Americans this is good news. It means that finally our borders are becoming more secure and the more secure our borders are, the safer our country will be. But to many liberal politicians and others who dwell among the more so called 'progressive' share of the population, this news is just terrible. Nancy Pelosi and New York Governor DiBlasio are devastated by this turn of events. So too are many Hollywood actors. All of these people have the same thing in common. They insist that the laws of the land be enforced, but only those laws that they agree with. The laws that they don't like, such as border security and immigration, are to be ignored. And as far as building that border wall goes, they are fiercely opposed to any wall designed to keep people out. They make their position on this perfectly clear from behind the walls and guarded gates of the mansions that they themselves live in.

Here are some more numbers for you this week. Recent surveys and polls are showing that there is an increase in the number of American women of all demographics and in every part of the country (legally) buying guns. And it's not just a noticeable increase, it's a big increase. In fact, the PEW survey and Professor John Lott, who is an expert on Second Amendment Issues, have reported that in the year 2000, only 35% of Americans thought that having a gun in the home made them safer. That number has since shot up to (no pun intended) 63% and the biggest increase responding in the affirmative were women. And now, even 41% of Democrats agree; a huge jump since 2000.

The political ramifications of this new trend do not bode well for gun control advocates going into the future. Second Amendment rights are becoming more important to an increasing number of citizens and it's now clear that this was a contributing factor in the election loss of Hillary Clinton and a number of other office seekers nationwide, who made their anti-Second Amendment stances part of their campaigns.

So, what are the reasons for the current trends regarding gun ownership? The surveys indicate it's a mixed bag. Safety and the fear of crime is one of the driving factors. With the threat of home grown and foreign caused terrorism frequently in the news, the added security that many feel owning a firearm adds to that safety is a big incentive. There is also a major uptick in the popularity of the 'shooting sports'. More gun ranges, quite a few of them family friendly, are opening all across the nations. Shooting skeet and trap is also a pass time that is gaining enthusiasts. When you factor that in with growing numbers of hunters in America, all these things add up to an increasing acceptance of what detractors call this nation's 'gun culture'.

This growing interest in gun ownership among so many more Americans has also exposed the ineffectiveness of the massive and well-funded campaign to discourage or actually demonize it. Hundreds of millions of dollars by billionaires like George Soros, Michael Bloomberg and others, along with Hollywood activists and anti-gun themed public service announcements constantly being aired, is falling flat and all but ignored. More Americans than ever are making their own decisions on this issue and if these latest surveys are right, it a trend that will continue for a long time to come. The times certainly are changing.

"The Battle"

The third of a 3-part series on the History of Evacuation Day

E sperience has taught us in Boston that rain, sleet, snow, gale force winds and freezing temperatures that arrive sometimes in February and March are known as a "Nor'easter". Unaccustomed, The British could only equate this phenomenon to as "Hurrycane".

The British plan was to cross to Castle William (Castle Island), assemble, and then assault across at "Dorchester Point". Instead General Howe later wrote a "Hurricane" had forced the cancellation of the assault 'in the fear they would all be lost" due to the weather. The same storm that drove the British indoors was used by the Americans as a fortuitous opportunity to strengthen their defenses, so that when the storm abated by noon on March 6, the British realized their chance to assault had passed. Undeterred, a squadron of warships weighed anchor and with sails full attempted to close on the North Shore (First Street). The looming Heights of the "Bush Tree" Hill forced the British to attempt a dangerous maneuver.

Shifting nearly every cannon to one side of the ship, the British intended this would allow the few cannons remaining on the other side to gain enough elevation to strike the American position on "Bush Tree". This rarely used tactic carried the danger of swamping or even capsizing the ship. The North Shore at the time was riddled with inlets, barely submerged mud flats, and deepwater channels. This unpredictability, plus the batteries at "Bush Tree" and "Dorchester Point", made the danger of grounding a ship under American guns too great to allow the British ships' cannons to continue firing and this action was halted.

At "Dorchester Point" the Americans were giddy at the British ships retreat. They began waving flags, gesturing, and generally taunting the British Troops at Castle William (Castle Island). The British at the castle had fired but found the range prohibitive. To counter this, the British attempted a double load of powder. Unfortunately this caused cannon to explode killing and wounding several British. That ended the day's events and on March 7 an unspoken truce seemed to be in place and the British began making preparations to pack up.

On March 8 the intently watching Americans were dismayed to observe and receive reports that the British efforts toward withdrawing had turned into looting and destruction. It was then Washington played his final card. With sunset the Americans, who had kept their last 10 cannons behind the base of "Nook Hill" at "C" and 3rd Street, began the construction of the final and closest battery. Late into the night the American troops labored. Then, perhaps due to overconfidence, a soldier lit a fire for warmth.

Almost immediately the British "Green" Battery (at Washington and The late Brian R. Mahoney left an indelible mark on this community, especially in his devotion to our traditions, as both a veteran and civic leader. His chronicling of our history is immortalized through this newspaper. South Boston lost one of its favorite sons, suddenly and sadly just three short months ago. Please enjoy the third of a three-part series about the history of Evacuation Day that Brian originally penned in 2011. It is only fitting that we honor his memory in the lead up to one of his fondest endeavors – THE PARADE

Berkeley Streets), alerted to their location, began a deadly fire. A company of the 10th Artillery Regiment under Captain Thomas Pierce continued to work under this withering fire. This unfinished position attempted to return fire. A 17-year-old Private, Stephen Jennings of Norton, dashed back and forth bringing powder to the cannons. It was during one of these runs he was felled by a bursting shell. Watching this was 25 yr old Sgt. Obadiah Adams from Littleton and 33 yr old Surgeon Enoch Dole from Lancaster. Along with two other soldiers, they grabbed a litter and ran to aid Jennings. Sadly, as all four gathered round his fallen form, yet another British shell exploded, killing all four of the rescue party. Ironically, the act of aiding and hovering over Jennings, by the four, shielded him and he survived with the loss of a hand and eye. The firing continued all night, ending at sunrise after over 800 cannon balls had been fired and the American abandoned the fortification attempts

This action seems, at least initially, to have prompted the British to cease the town's destruction and continue the evacuation. Still by the morning of the 14th Washington had tired of the British stalling tactics. He was well aware more troops had already sailed from England. In any event, Washington was spoiling for a fight. "If the enemy will be kind enough to come out for a fight, I mean to give them one" he stated. In full view and in broad daylight, the very place that the very first soldiers of this new army, of this new nation, under this new commanding General had given the "last full measure", he ordered to be fortified.

By late afternoon on March 16th, this final and most ominous position was completed. The next day, March 17th, the last British ship cleared Boston Harbor by noon as American troops entered the city. These troops discov-

ered the final contempt of the British who had looted and used churches and meeting houses cavalry stables. In fact, in violation of the cease fire, they set Castle William ablaze as they left. Washington, expecting English treachery, placed in command as Officer of the Day (O.D.) General John Sullivan of County Wexford and made the password "St. Patrick". So in effect the great British Empire surrendered their first American Colony to an Irish Catholic. This would probably be comparable to a former plantation slave owner working and taking orders under former African slave. "Those that laugh last, laugh best."

How did this action, without which, arguably, the revolution would have failed, become a footnote in history? Would the Revolution have survived without their secure base in Boston? The British successfully moved in and occupied New York, New Jersey and Philadelphia. Over the next year, the only other American victory was the Christmas raid at Trenton, so how did the victory at Boston become so overlooked?

When the British fleet sailed away on that St. Patrick's morning, they left behind their hatred of the Irish and Catholics that remains with us in some form and by some people to this day. Consider that the battle occurred 240 years ago but for the first 130 years it was never observed. This is only the 114th observance. The ruling political elite were determined to keep the Irish in their place, but the joining of St. Patrick's and Evacuation was seen by the Irish, as divine intervention.

That and the flood tide of Irish Immigration swelled their ranks to political power. Prior to that, every undesirable activity was placed in South Boston by the ruling elite. The poor house and insane asylum were **Continued on page 6**



MAYOR WALSH ANNOUNCES BODY CAMERA PILOT PROGRAM EXTENSION

ayor Martin J. Walsh and Boston Police Commissioner William Evans announced an agreement with the Boston Police Patrolmen's Association (BPPA) to extend the Body Worn Camera Pilot Program by an additional six months to ensure sufficient data is available for an effective study of the program.

"This extension is a positive development and I look forward

to continuing to build on the success of this pilot program," Mayor Walsh said. "We are fortunate to have one of the best police forces in the country and our officers work hand in hand with the community to make all neighborhoods safer. I thank Commissioner Evans and the BPPA for their continued willingness to work together on this initiative."

The extension agreement maintains that up to 100 patrol officers will be equipped with body cameras in which on-duty police activity will be conducted. Patrol officers currently equipped with body cameras will continue to participate in the pilot program. If necessary, replacement officers will be trained and assigned by the Boston Police Department.

"I am pleased that the pilot program will be continuing through what tends to be our busiest months of the year," Commission-

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er Evans said. "Extending through the summer will give us the opportunity to keep the body worn cameras out in the community and will provide additional data to assist with the assessment of the program. I would like to thank Mayor Walsh, the union leadership of the BPPA and the officers who are participating in this pilot program for their continued commitment to exploring this new policing tool."

Conducting the pilot program over a full year will allow for observations to be made in all seasons and various situations. Further, the BPD will issue a Request for Proposals, funded by the City of Boston, within two weeks to allow for independent analysis to be conducted by an expert in the field

placed in South Boston. Except for the "Twin Hills", all of our "Heights" were leveled to fill in the Back Bay. A 45 acre park created for South Boston residents was first re-claimed by the Government as a military base and is now site of the Convention Center. When the Dorchester Heights Monument was dedicated in 1902 the guest speaker referred to the longstanding discrimination toward the Irish South Boston by noting "The Mayflower and the Shamrock have finally joined". Even then St. Patrick could only be celebrated under the umbrella of Evacuation Day.

Yet, even today, a simple parade to honor the military birth of America and

for a more comprehensive review of the available data, comparisons of body worn camera technologies and vendors and best practices for the BPD.

The Body Worn Camera Pilot Program was created by viewing best practices in other municipalities across the country with input from police departments and officers, the BPD Social Justice Task Force, the Harvard Law Criminal Justice Program and through community feedback.



Remembering Peg Flaherty on St. Patrick's Day





Boston's First Evacuation Day

On March 17, 1776 British troops evacuated the town of Boston, under threat from cannons on Dorchester Heights. It was General George Washington's first victory in the war for American independence.

George Washington in Massachusetts

The Revolutionary War started with the Battles of Lexington and Concord in April 1775. In Philadelphia, the Second Continental Congress met in a crisis atmosphere. Delegates selected Virginia's George Washington to lead an American army and force the British from Boston.



Bill from a Springfield Tavern Keeper Boston was a long way from Philadelphia. Along the

Seizing the High Ground

Washington quickly saw the advantages

of fortifying Dorchester Heights (in present day South Boston.) Cannons mounted there could "annoy the town" in the words of British General Gage. They could also threaten the British fleet at close range.

A Noble Train of Artillery

General Washington dispatched 25 year-old Henry Knox to retrieve

British cannons captured by Ethan Allen at Fort Ticonderoga in New York. In an epic journey Knox used oxen and horses to drag the cannons 300 miles over snow and ice to Washington's headquarters in Cambridge. Knox's "noble train of artillery" arrived in January 1776.





"St. Patrick" was the Password

On the night of March 4-5, 1776, 3,000 soldiers constructed forts on Dorchester Heights. British officers were astonished the next morning. An admiral warned that his ships "could not possibly remain in the harbor under the fire of the batteries from Dorchester Neck."

Evacuation

British General William Howe believed that honor demanded an attack on the rebel forts. Embarking by boat, his soldiers were blown off course by a violent storm. Realizing that the forts would grow stronger each day Howe ordered preparations for the evacuation of Boston.




For days an east wind and heavy rain pinned the British fleet in the harbor. Finally on March 17, 1776 - Saint Patrick's Day — the fleet sailed. Washington selected the phrase "Saint Patrick" as the password that day.





Captain Lanny Boswell is currently serving as the Commanding Officer of the United



First St. Patrick's Day Parade Held In 1737

he first meeting of Irishmen on American soil to honor St. Patrick took place in Boston on March 17th, 1737. The first St. Patrick's Day parade was held in New York in 1762. Curiously enough, before marching caught on, St. Patrick's Day was celebrated with huge breakfasts, held around 2pm held in local taverns.

Some of these breakfasts were private affairs...others were hosted by the newly formed Irish Friendly Societies. Often, forty of fifty toasts were made in one sitting!

A report in the American newspaper 'The Gazette' in 1766 states: "St. Patrick's Day was ushered in with fife and drum. This produced a very agreeable harmony before the doors of many gentlemen of the Irish nation."

The general tradition of organizing St. Patrick's Day parades originated in the nineteenth century. After New York, Boston had its first parade in 1812. And by the late 1860's, over a dozen American cities had large St. Patrick's Day parades. Just 10 years later, the Irish were the majority in population in New York. Not surprisingly, its largely due to the American example that St. Patrick's Day is celebrated throughout the world even in places where the Irish connection is slight, like New Orleans and Puerto Rico.

ple, from so many ethnic cultures, from different generations, from different economic backgrounds, from different sexual orientation, from so many religions, and with varying talents, opinion and capabilities, flock here? If so, then why do we need a selfish, dogmatic, intolerant, divisive and exploitative organization like Mass Equality to tell us there is something wrong with us?

Moving on to the real point of this commentary, the attraction of South Boston is as puzzling, as it is obvious. Long a place where blue collar Irish, Italians, Lithuanians, Albanians and others worked the Commercial Waterfront, the Fish Pier, the Edison Plant, the Transit Authority, Construction Trades, the Police and Fire Departments, its proximity to downtown Boston, its accessible beach front, and the oases known as the Harbor Islands were taken for granted. Its reputation as depicted in Hollywood movies is as mythical, as it is deserved. Legendary characters


and their stories are embellished, as much by ill-informed newcomers, as by those who actually knew them.

As a necessary backdrop to the point of this, the impact of forced busing in the 70s is as real, as it is ancient history. Its storyline and imagery continues to be referenced whenever the daily press is looking to sell newspapers. You see, South Boston is a victim of its own strong sense of place. Its success as a community has become a double-edged dilemma for the families who fought hard to preserve the neighborhood and its way of life. Back then, they fought the law not because they were bigots, but because they wanted to send their children to a school near their home, where they knew they'd be safe. This adage is as poignant as it is complex – the more things change, the more they remain the same.


Fast forward 40 years and the people who are now moving into South Boston and other neighborhoods around the City want the very same **Continued on page 23**
