### South Boston Non-Profits' Program Funding Vetoed

he Massachusetts House and Senate recently approved a compromise \$40 Billion budget that included funds for many South Boston programs including Julie's Family Learning Center, the Gavin Foundation, South Boston Community Health Center, Laboure Center, the South Boston Neighborhood House, South Boston En Accione and the South Boston Collaborative Center. These funds fill a crucial gap in the budget of each of these organizations and are earmarked for ongoing and advanced programs that are important to the client population being served.

However, there are no guarantees and following a pattern of recent bud-

get uncertainties, the Governor vetoed all of the South Boston programs, each of whom rely on the funding. The state budget passed in July with overwhelming support in both the House of Representatives and the Senate. Now the efforts to reinstate these crucial funds has just begun, but the burden of affect-

but most importantly,



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


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### **Window Into The State House**

#### Helping hands reach Texas

Help is flowing from the Boston area to the coast of Texas, where President Trump plans to visit Tuesday even as former hurricane Harvey continues to unleash unprecedented rainfall and flooding. Houston's Democratic mayor is already extending thanks to his Boston counterpart for assistance and the Cape Ann town of Rockport, meanwhile, is extending a hand to the Texas town with the same name that was in the direct path of the storm as it came ashore, the Gloucester Times reports.

Meanwhile, Shira Schoenberg of MassLive asks the question we probably don't want to hear the answer to: Could a hurricane Harvey happen in Massachusetts? Mark Herz of WGBH has details on how members of the Mass. National Guard are assisting in

### Baker plans to steer way around GOP Senate primary

Gov. Charlie Baker is going to stay well out of the way of the GOP senate primary next year, because ... well, why would he go anywhere near it? Baker says he stays out of primaries "as a general rule and I certainly won't get involved with that one," State House News Service's Andy Metzger and Matt Murphy report. With Trump backers Geoff Diehl and Shiva Ayyadurai likely competing against moderates such as John Kingston and Beth Lindstrom who like Baker

have sought to keep Trump at arm's length, the primary has the potential for collateral political damage for anyone, even the country's most popular governor.

### Logan fee plan reverberates locally, nationally

MassPort's plan to study whether to charge vehicles that are arriving at Logan Airport to pick up or drop off airline passengers is making national headlines and becoming a hot topic on talk radio. Adam Vaccaro of the Globe reports that the Conservation Law Foundation will help study how such a fee would impact traffic congestion at the airport. The study is part of a larger agreement between MassPort and the CLF over a plan to add 5,000 more parking spaces at the airport.

ing the political process and making the case for these programs over the interests of competing programs statewide must be a priority of each stakeholder.

When reached, Senator Linda
Forry stated, "We strongly advocated and secured funding for several
nonprofit organizations that provide
critical support services for families
in South Boston. Representative
Nick Collins and I are committed
to making sure these organizations
continue to receive the resources
they need to serve the most vulnerable members of our community."

Representative Nick Collins said, "We worked very hard to secure support in this year's budget for South Boston programs and we need to work together to ensure that these critical resources get restored."

Bob Monahan, the Executive Director of Julie's Learning Center stated, "In some cases the government seems to be turning its back on those in need. Julies' deals with people willing to work hard and do what it takes to make sure their children have access to a better education and a better life than they had. They are not looking for handouts".

Monahan went on to say that government continues to move the goal post on eligibility qualification requirements. He further acknowledged that "it is clear that the funding provided by the state enables Julies and the other non-profits to reach out to and to help more families."

In addition to speaking with Senator Forry, Representative Collins and Director Monahan, South Boston Today has contacted many of the programs for their reaction to this revelation of the vetoes, but at deadline, this reporter hadn't received further responses.

Lobbying on behalf of one's legitimate interest is embedded in the framing of the Constitution by the founding fathers. In 1788, James Madison acknowledged as much in the Federalist Papers. This includes non-profit organizations, their board members and their constituencies, as well as citizens in general and business interests.

Gubernatorial veto overrides are expected to be taken up in early September and there is time for South Boston non-profits to weigh in. SBT will be following this effort.



















## Flaherty Opens South Boston Campaign Headquarters

Our keynote speaker will be General George Casey, U.S. Army, former Chief of Staff of the Army,


Also attending the rededication ceremony will be the families of the 25 men from South Boston who were killed in action during the Vietnam War, Medal of Honor recipients

Tom Kelley and Ryan Pitts, along with many of the South Boston Vietnam Veterans. We are dedicating this year's ceremony in memory of the three South Boston Medal of Honor recipients.

The South Boston Vietnam Memorial was among America's first formal memorial for Vietnam Veterans – predating the dedication of the national Vietnam Veterans Memorial in Washington, D.C. by 13 months - and honors 25 men from South Boston who gave their lives during the Vietnam War. South Boston suffered the highest loss of KIA for a community of its size in the country.

The South Boston Vietnam Memorial was dedicated on Sept. 13, 1981, and a rededication ceremony is held every September.

## General George W. Casey, Jr. (U.S. Army, Retired)

eneral George Casey enjoyed a 41-year career in the US Army following his graduation from Georgetown University's School of Foreign Service in 1970. He is an accomplished soldier and an authority on strategic leadership.

As the Army Chief of Staff from 2007-2011, he led one of our largest and most complex organizations during one of the most extraordinary periods in our history. From July 2004 to February 2007, he commanded the Multi-National Force – Iraq, a coalition of more than 30 countries where he guided the mission through

its toughest days.

Currently, he lectures internationally on leadership to the leaders of national and multinational corporations, at the Johnson School of Management, Cornell University, and at other business schools.

He holds a Master's Degree in International Relations from Denver University, and served as a Senior Fellow at the Atlantic Council of the United States. He has published a book, Strategic Reflections, Operation Iraqi Freedom, July 2004-2007 (October 2012), about his experiences in Iraq.



## Springtime Down Under

I t's getting cooler with each passing day (and night!) and it won't be long before the heat is on and fireplaces will start crackling. Quite a different story is unfolding half a world away, however; in the Southern Hemisphere, vineyards from Chile to South Africa and everywhere in between will start to come alive with first flowerings and new vintages of red wines will soon be available here in the U.S.

One of the regions that I haven't written about this summer season is Australia and it's not because there isn't a lot to cover. This country/continent is one of the world's largest wine producers, with production last year of about 1.5 billion litres of wine; over 30 million glasses of Australian wine are served every day, worldwide.

In the Barossa Valley, located in South Australia, there are over

150 wineries and vineyards and the area began producing wines back in the late 1830's. One of the most productive areas, Fleurieu, reminds visitors of Paso Robles in California. Hot and dry with chalky soil, the region produces world-class Shiraz wines in the McLaren Vale and Cabs from Langhorne Creek.

Beresford Wines, while new to the producing side (1985) is making huge reds, especially Shiraz. The Beresford Classic McLaren Vale Shiraz, 2015, (\$22.99), is big and bold, with layers of blackcurrant and plums on the nose and ripe cherry and earthy tones that are mouth-filling; the finish is very long and no wonder, as the alcohol level is 16.5%.

The Beresford Classic McLaren Vale GSM (Grenache Shiraz Mourvedre) 2015, (\$23.99), is an Australian salute to the Rhone Valley in France. Like the great reds there, this wine had body as well as balance, with clove and mint notes, as well as dense flavors of dried berries and some vanilla; also, a very long and layered finish.

Both of these wines pair extremely well with grilled red meats, lamb and boar; hearty cheeses and spicy Asian cuisine also work.

In the Langhorne Creek area of Fleurieu, several miles inland from the Vale, this lightly-populated town (668 people!) is home to scores of vineyards. One of the most interesting is Kimbolton Vineyards, where the Case family has been making wine and adding to the acreage since 1911.

Their Kimbolton Fig Tree 2014 Cabernet Sauvignon, (\$22.99), is a classic Southern Australia Cab; bright notes of mulberries, chocolate/mint and dusty oak on the nose.The palate swirls with ripe red and black fruits and cassis and mint fill the mouth, framed by elegant dusty tannins, all complemented by the use of only the best French Oak. This wine is in for the long haul and the family expects it will cellar till 2028.

Bleasdale Vineyards is one of Langhorne's oldest-167 years and six generations- that offer a wide range of levels and types of wine. Chief among them are the Cabs and one in particular, the 2014 Mulberry Tree Cabernet Sauvignon, (\$17.99), is an elegant wine with aromas of mixed berries, dark chocolate and violets. The palate is smooth with blackcurrant and spicy oak flavors and finishes with fine chalky tannins. It's one to have with your first Prime Rib or Lamb roast. You'll want more than one, though!


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## L Street Night, The Tradition Continues SOUTH BOSTON TODAY - By Staff

outside the stadium. Any player who registered, but has not been contacted by a coach and does not know their team, should go to the clubhouse at 4:30pm, where an information table has been set up.

Coaches should be at the clubhouse at 5:00 pm to pick up their jerseys and line up with their teams and have their team get all set with great costumes on the kids.

So if you want to have some fun and cheer on the kids, then make it a point to be at the stadium, Thursday September 7th at 6:00 pm for the "PARADE OF CHAMPIONS"..

the deficit to seven, but that was as close as they would get before time ran out. The Young Guns are a talented team but their opponent had an advantage on the boards they just couldn't overcome.

This week, Danny shared his thoughts on some of the top stories in the sports world:

y the time you read this, perhaps the Boston Celtics' blockbuster trade with the Cleveland Cavaliers will be made official, even though we all thought it was official last week. Talk about a wacky situation. In case you missed it, the Cavs traded Kyrie Irving to the Celtics in exchange for Isaiah Thomas, Jae Crowder, Ante Zizic, and the 2018 Brooklyn Pick. But when Cleveland got to see details of Thomas' hip injury first-hand, they started having second thoughts. At least, it's been reported that the Cavs have had second thoughts. Then reports claimed the Cavs were going to ask the Celtics for another asset in order to finalize the trade. To that, I say no way. The C's shouldn't have to give Cleveland anything else. And if the Cavs are truly using Thomas' injury -which they knew about before they made the trade -- as leverage to maybe get another player or draft pick, then Danny Ainge should call their bluff. Because then, and only then, will we see if the Cavs are stupid enough to pass on the 2018 Brooklyn Pick. If LeBron James is leaving Cleveland after this year, and if that's the reason Irving

asked for a trade, then it's that Brooklyn pick which is the most important asset in this deal for the Cavs. There's no way that Cleveland walks away from acquiring that pick. No bleeping way. So the Celtics shouldn't give the Cavs any additional assets. This is the trade, and there's nothing Cleveland can do about it.

When Julian Edelman went down with a torn ACL last Friday night, the New England Patriots became a worse football team than they were before the injury. But you know what we do here in New England with our football team. We immediately defer to "next man up." You can't laugh at the philosophy. Because, with the Patriots, it works. How many times have we seen key players go down with an injury, be released, or get traded, and somebody else on the roster steps in and does the damn job? There's a reason why we expect it to happen. Because it always does. Heck, the Patriots just won the Super Bowl without Rob Gronkowski, who is arguably the most dangerous tight end the NFL has ever seen in the history of the league. So I get it. If the Pats can survive without Gronk, they can survive under any situa-

tion in which Tom Brady is still the quarterback and Bill Belichick is still the head coach. But make no mistake about it, when Edelman went down for the season during the team's third preseason game, the Patriots didn't become a better football team. Edelman was Mr. Reliable. His ability to get open and pull in crucial passes over the middle is a huge reason why I always feel confident that the Patriots' offense is going to come out on top. Obviously Brady has a whole lot to do with that, but Edelman has been Brady's top-dog for a number of years now. And when you lose that key piece, who makes most of the big plays for you in big spots, that's a devastating loss, for the quarterback and the entire team. So while I do believe that the Patriots offense is still stacked, and that they'll still win the AFC East and get back to the AFC Championship Game, losing Edelman is a devastating blow. It's OK to admit that and still believe the Patriots can do something special once again this season.

The Boston Bruins are back in the news, but not for all the right reasons. The B's couldn't really do anything to match the Celtics'

offseason, which is understandable. Still, they could have found a way to come up with some type of contract agreement with one of their best young players, 21-year-old David Pastrnak, who is a restricted free agent. He's reportedly turned down an offer of \$6 million per year. We can try to compare other players' deals all we want, but at the end of the day, we don't really know just how much more than \$6 million Pastrnak wants. Does he want more than \$7 million a season? Or does he want \$6.5 million and an extra year? If it's the latter, then there's no excuse for the Bruins not to do that right now. The kid had a breakout season with 34 goals last year. But if he wants more than \$7 million a year, that seems pretty nuts to me, considering he hasn't really done all that much to make those demands. But since he's only 21, I think I'd probably have to succumb to the pressures of Pastrnak's crazy demands and give him the monster contract. Mainly because I'm sick of trading away
