Boston apparently intends to go full speed ahead with rebuilding Long Island Bridge for traffic to get to an addiction recovery center on the harbor island. The City believes that their approach to construction will minimize heavy traffic through Quincy streets and mitigate that its concerns over public safety. It was just about a year ago that the topic had resurfaced and press secretary for Mayor Walsh, Nicole Caravella said in an email that "We have no new

And then of course there's Castle Island,



Walsh floats plan to get around Quincy's Long Island roadblocks: Barges

Unless Quincy imposes a naval blockade, Boston Mayor Marty Walsh thinks he's found a sure-fire way to counter Quincy's opposition to his Long Island plans. From the Globe's Milton Valencia: "The Walsh administration said Tuesday that it will move forward with plans to rebuild the Long Island Bridge by floating in parts of the structure on barges — hoping to assuage officials from nearby Quincy who are worried about noisy construction vehicles rumbling down their roads."

But here's the thing: Is
Quincy really concerned about
construction trucks rumbling
down its roads – or who might
inhabit Long Island after
construction is finished? We'll
soon know if, or when, we start
hearing about how Walsh's
amphibious plans violate U.S.
Coast Guard rules, threaten
right whales, harm fishermen,
disrupt ancient mussel beds,
etc. The lawsuit possibilities
are almost endless.

In Quincy, eminent domain battle looms

Quincy obviously doesn't mind construction vehicles rumbling through other parts of the city. In fact, it wants them to start rumbling as soon as possible. But it may be headed for a messy legal battle over use of eminent domain powers in its efforts to speed up redevelopment of Quincy's downtown, Sean Phillip Cotter reports in the Patriot Ledger.

Rentin' on the Ritz in Southie

It's the most-viewed piece in the Globe as of this morning – and for good reason. Adrian Walker has a terrific column on the South Boston public-housing tenant who's been advertising and subletting his somewhat shy-of-the-Ritz-Carlton abode in Southie – and who's now in trouble with the Boston Housing Authority. "Undeniably, the tenant's side project is at odds with the mission of public housing," Walker writes. "And yet, I can't help having some admiration for a tenant who figures out how to get a foot into the new economy."

But don't blame Pittsfield ...

If the marijuana market does come out of the gates a little 'sparse,' no one can blame Pittsfield. The Berkshire County city, which has said it would entertain as many as 35 retail licenses, gave initial approval to five new potrelated businesses on Tuesday, Amanda Drane reports in The Berkshire Eagle.

Averting the next Mount Ida debacle -- while rescuing UMass-Boston

The Herald's Kathleen McKiernan reports that the state Department of Higher Education hopes to increase government oversight of private colleges and universities in order to protect students at financially troubled schools – like those at the soonto-close Mount Ida College.

Speaking of Mount Ida, the Globe's Laura Krantz reports on just how dire the financial situation was for the Newton-based school before it decided to close shop and sell off its campus to UMass-Amherst. Meanwhile, state senators have "invited" top higher-ed officials, including UMass president Marty Meehan, to testify later this month at a State House hearing

on the controversial UMass-Amherst takeover of Mount Ida's Newton campus, reports SHNS's Katie Lannan (pay wall). At the Globe, Howard E. Horton and Robert Antonucci explain in an opinion piece just how poorly the UMass-Mount Ida move has been handled by school officials on both sides.

Last but not least, the Globe, in an editorial, asks Gov. Charlie Baker and legislators not to forget UMass-Boston's own dire financial problems, as UMass-Amherst pushes ahead to spend \$70 million to acquire a potentially competing campus in Newton.

Pelosi: Sorry, Seth, I'm running for speaker again

In Boston yesterday for a Democratic fundraiser hosted by U.S. Rep. Katherine Clark, House Minority Leader Nancy Pelosi says she intends to remain leader of House Democrats and run for speaker again next year, assuming Dems regain control of the House, critics be damned, reports the Globe's Liz Goodwin. But what if Dems don't regain control of the House this year? The Globe's Scot Lehigh can't get a straight answer from Pelosi. But U.S. Rep. Seth Moulton is making it pretty clear: She's gone if Dems don't win this fall.

Eric Holder for president?

Speaking of national political players blowing into Boston yesterday: In his visit to a state with no shortage of presidential wannabes, former U.S. Attorney General Eric Holder made news at Harvard by admitting he's mulling a run for president himself. "I'm thinking about it," said Holder. The Globe's Maddie Kilgannon has more.

Environmentalists and real estate agents going at it over Baker's home energy scorecard bill

From Paige Smith at the BBJ: "As Gov. Charlie Baker's home energy scorecard bill is slated for a Joint Committee on Telecommunications, Utilities and Energy public hearing (today), environmentalists and the real estate community stand at odds. Baker's late-filed legislation (H 4371) would call for mandatory energy efficiency audits to determine a property's energy usage" before the sale of homes.

Nick Collins Elected 1st Suffolk District Senator

t the suggestion of his astute wife Olivia, Senator-elect Nick Collins chose to host his Senate campaign victory party at the Blarney Stone Restaurant, smack dab in the center of the First Suffolk District on Dorchester Avenue. It was the same venue that hosted his campaign loss for the same seat 5 years ago, almost to the day. Olivia reckoned that one way to purge that painful memory is to replace it with a new wonderful one and indeed he did, as the restaurant was packed with supporters, who

welcomed in an era of 'access and opportunity' for what Collins called the "most ethnically diverse Senate District in the Commonwealth".

In addition to thanking his family, friends, staff and political allies from his career representing South Boston and Dorchester, he also pointed to the throng of new supporters in the audience from the Vietnamese, African American, Cape Verdean, Caribbean communities from Hyde Park and Mattapan as evidence of the unity of purpose that he plans to bring to his responsibilities.

According to unofficial results,

Collins garnered more than 86 percent of 4,713 votes cast in a three-way race to fill the unexpired term of Linda Dorcena Forry, who announced in January that she was stepping down from her state Senate post to take a job in the private sector.

The First Suffolk District stretches from Mattapan to the Seaport and includes South Boston and Dorchester. The special election drew 4.2 percent of the district's 111,434 registered voters to the polls, according to the city's website.

Collins pointed out the district's rich history and that "he is honored

to be given the opportunity to help make it better for everyone". Collins added, "If we all work together, we can improve our schools and public transit system, create more affordable housing, address the opioid epidemic, make our neighborhoods cleaner and safer and make sure that everyone has a chance to benefit from our city's strong economy".

Senator-elect Collins will serve the remainder of this term and will run again in September. He will be sworn into office on May 9 by Governor Charlie Baker. There will be a ceremonial swearing-in at the Senate on May 10.

MAYOR WALSH INVESTS \$2.4 BILLION

Guided by Imagine Boston 2030

ayor Martin J. Walsh presented his \$2.4 billion Imagine Boston Capital Plan (Fiscal Year 2019 - 2023), which makes critical investments in every Boston neighborhood, guided by Boston's citywide plan, Imagine Boston 2030. From a new playground at Harambee Park and to a new library in Upham's Corner, to kitchen upgrades at 25 Boston schools, to new fire engines and fire houses, the City's capital investments aim to enhance all aspects of Boston's neighborhoods and provide more opportunities for Boston's working families.

As Boston approaches the one year mark since Imagine Boston 2030 was released, Mayor Walsh has aligned 84 percent of the investments in the Capital Plan with the City's planning efforts, including:

- Investing \$1 billion over ten years to bring Boston's school buildings into the 21st century;
- Investing \$967 million to implement core initiatives outlined in Go Boston 2030 to create streets that are safer, travel that is more reliable, and transportation choices that will interconnect our neighborhoods;
- Carrying out Imagine Boston 2030 open space goals to invest in the City's public parks by leveraging Winthrop Square sale proceeds, City capital dollars and external funds;
- Preparing for climate change by developing more detailed climate plans for Boston's neighborhoods, as part of Climate Ready Boston;
- Improving quality of life for residents by enabling affordable housing development through public infrastructure projects;
- Demonstrating the City's leadership and commitment to sustainable funding for the arts through the Percent for Art program, which will support the commissioning of public art.

"It's our priority to create growth and opportunity for every Bostonian in every neighborhood," said Mayor Walsh. "Investing in initiatives and projects that bring shared growth, success, and greater equity is critical for our city to reach its full potential. Our budget is focused on making long-term investments that continue to lift up Boston's middle class, as we ensure Boston is a city that works for all its families."

Under the Imagine Boston 2030 plan, the Walsh Administration is investing in the core goals of BuildBPS, Go Boston 2030, Boston Creates, and Climate Ready Boston.

Mayor's Walsh's Imagine Boston Capital Plan makes investments in departments and resources key to boosting Boston's middle class, including:

Education

The capital plan invests heavily in Boston Public Schools, reflecting the Walsh Administration's \$1 billion commitment to upgrade Boston's classrooms through BuildB-PS, its ten-year school facilities master plan. The largest investment in the Capital Plan, a new building for the Boston Arts Academy, allocates \$124.8 million for design and construction in partnership with the Massachusetts School Building Authority. The new school building will support the BAA's dual arts and academic curriculum. The City's capital plan will also invest in school infrastructure, as well as equitable, accessible facilities.

Transportation

Since unveiling the City's Go Boston 2030 transportation plan, Mayor Walsh has continued to prioritize strengthening and creating transportation options that are safe, reliable and equitable. The capital plan invests in these largescale infrastructure improvements, including an \$18 million multi-year Massachusetts Avenue bridge project; a \$100 million investment to rehabilitate and renew the Northern Avenue Bridge; and a \$218 million investment to build a new North Washington Street bridge. Trans-



portation improvements means creating a healthier, more accessible Boston -- and that also includes the City's investment in rebuilding the Long Island bridge. Through this capital plan, Boston will invest \$90 million in rebuilding the bridge to Long Island. On Long Island, Boston will create a long-term recovery campus which will serve those individuals in and around Boston who need access to recovery services.

Parks and Open Space

Parks and open space are some of Boston's most loved places, and the capital budget continues to invest in preserving and improving open spaces for Boston residents, and generations to come. With this capital plan, the Walsh Administration will invest in the largest-ever capital funding for Boston parks.

Community Centers

The City's Capital Plan for BCYF targets an increase to programming capacity at the City's community centers and supports high-quality facilities. Community centers provide families, children and teens with enriching programs such as after school care, athletics, job and computer training. We are investing in renovations in our community centers to upgrade community centers as well as BCYF pools around the city to ensure a fun and safe environment for all of the community members that seek to utilize the facility.

Energy and Environment

Building on the success of the first phase of Climate Ready Boston in East Boston and Charlestown, the capital plan will allocate an additional \$1.6 million to fur-

ther resiliency initiatives to protect the city and provide more detailed reviews of additional neighborhoods. This includes an additional \$600,000 for climate resilience planning for City neighborhoods and municipal facilities affected by climate change. It also includes \$1 million to support the development of a study that will examine the feasibility of constructing a barrier in Boston Harbor in response to expected sea level rise due to climate change. The Renew Boston Trust was launched during the Walsh Administration and has systematically identified energy efficiency projects in the City's 315 buildings to both lower energy bills and reduce emissions.

Housing

This plan reflects an effort to continue the Administration's work to encourage housing production, increase affordable housing options, and reduce displacement. Municipal finance law does not allow the City to use city capital dollars to support private housing but does allow public infrastructure projects to enhance housing development.

Arts and Culture

With this capital plan, Boston will invest in creating new branch libraries, including a \$12.6 million investment to build a new addition at the Faneuil Branch Library in Brighton; a \$18.3 million investment in the design and construction of a branch library at Adams Street Library; a \$18 million investment in the development of a new Upham's Corner Branch Library; and a \$12 million investment to support continued on page 7

very spring, the City of Boston releases our Imagine Boston Capital Plan for the next five years. It outlines where our city's budget will be focused, our longer-term plans, and our priorities. Essentially, the capital plan details what initiatives and projects in your neighborhood and across the City that we'll be investing in to make Boston's future brighter.

From South Boston, to Mattapan, to Allston-Brighton, to Back Bay, it's my priority to create growth and opportunity for every Bostonian in every neighborhood. Boston will be at its best when all its residents have the

support and opportunity they need to thrive. Investing in initiatives and projects that bring shared growth, success, and greater equity is critical for our city to reach its full potential. Our Capital Plan invests in Boston's strongest asset: our people. Boston is a city that's world class because it works for the middle class, and our budget's priority is to keep supporting the working families that make Boston great.

Here in South Boston, we're investing in some exciting initiatives and projects that we hope you and your neighbors will enjoy for many years to come.

In South Boston, we know that shared community spaces around the neighborhood bring families and communities together and provide an important resource and gathering place for all. That's why we're investing \$15 million for a major renovation to the BCYF Curley Community Center. And we aren't stopping there — we're also investing \$1.1 million in new athletic field

lighting at Christopher Lee Playground and completing Martin's Park, a new \$7 million universally accessible park near the Children's Museum.

We will be investing in park improvements of \$715,000 for Flaherty Park; including a renovated play lot, pathways, and passive areas; \$510,000 to improve playing fields and other amenities at Orton Field; and \$180,000 investment to develop a Moakley Park Master Plan to ensure the park works for all residents. Libraries are part of our public spaces too, and the South Boston Branch Library will be getting a \$99,000 investment in landscaping and exterior improvements.

We're also investing in infrastructure in South Boston. We will be investing \$7.4 million for the reconstruction of Summer Street from Fort Point Channel to Boston Wharf Road, including improved roadway, sidewalks, street lighting, and a new cycle track. The \$250,000 reconstruction of Congress

Street from Fort Point Channel to West Service Road will provide safe, livable, and multi-modal city streets, including new sidewalks, street lights, trees, and street furniture. Finally, we will be investing \$100 million to refurbish and restore the Northern Avenue Bridge.

Our longer-term investments are intended to lift up our neighborhoods in ways that take into account the needs and wants of the community. With this Capital Plan, we're preparing our city for the next year, and the years forward. What's the next step for the Capital Plan? I have submitted the City of Boston's budget to the Boston City Council, where your City Councilor will review the proposed budget. Once the budget is approved, it will go into effect. This is the budget for fiscal year 2019, meaning the budget will take effect in July 2018, and run throughout the next 12 months.

I hope you'll take a few minutes to look through the budget proposal, online at budget.boston.gov. Together, I look forward to investing in our neighborhoods, and our people.

the construction of a new facility for the Fields Corner Branch Library. This budget also invests in renovating existing library, from a \$17.2 million renovation of the Dudley Branch Library in Roxbury, to a \$10.2 million investment in renovating the Roslindale Branch Library. FY19 also marks the second year of the City's Percent for the Arts program, a program that dedicates one percent, or \$1.7 million, of the City's annual capital budget for commissioning permanent, public art in municipal spaces.

Public Safety

The Walsh Administration's investments in the recommended budget and capital plan provide a comprehensive and multi-disciplinary approach to violence prevention and public safety that emphasizes opportunities and pathways away from violence. With a growing population and changing neighborhoods, Boston needs reliable public safety facilities that help meet the needs of Boston's residents. The City will complete the design for a new \$29.9 million East Boston Police Station this year. Another

investment of \$48.2 million will ensure that new fire stations at Engine 42 in Egleston Square and Engine 17 on Meetinghouse Hill are designed and equipped to both protect firefighter health and safety and meet the public safety needs of our growing city.

Imagine Boston 2030 is Boston's first citywide plan in 50 years aimed at guiding growth to support Boston's dynamic economy and expand opportunity for all residents. The plan prioritizes inclusionary growth and puts forth a comprehensive vision to boost quality of life, equity and resilience in every neighborhood across the City. Shaped by the input of 15,000 residents who contributed their thoughts to the plan, Imagine Boston 2030 identifies five action areas to guide Boston's growth, enhancement and preservation, and is paired with a set of metrics that will evaluate progress and successes. Randall has been doing it right with all the Bonny Doon wines for many years and the Rose is one of the vineyard's newer efforts.

2016 Château Minuty Côtes de Provence 'M de Minuty' Rosé, Provence, France (\$18)

Pale pink with watermelon rind, candied flowers, white peach, strawberry, sour cherry, and excellent, salty mineral character with just a hint of baking spice on the finish. The LeCalon family has been making this wine for the last two hundred years and the experience shows in every delicious sip.

2016 Famille Perrin Côtes du Rhône Reserve Rose, Rhone, France (\$14)

Clean and bright with delicious ripe grapefruit and blood-orange notes tinged with lofty dried herbs-de-provence notes. This is a versatile wine for the warmer weather; you can pair it with salads as a first course or match it up with any kind of shell-fish for a great meal out on the patio.

Bodegas Ramon Bilbao, LaLomba Rosado, Rioja Alta 2016, (\$18)
One of the new wave of Riojas to make a Provence-style rosé, from Garnacha grown at altitude in Rioja Baja plus 10% Viura. It's spicy and aromatic, with notes of redcurrant and white pepper: refreshing, polished, and very likeable. This is a real wine, not an insipid pink drink, with generous, Rioja character.

You'll be seeing more like this one from Spain this summer; when you do see them, buy them. A real taste treat.

Quinta do Perdigão, Rosé, Dão 2017, (\$14) Don't let the twee label of this wine put you off – the content is far better than the packaging! Just 6,000 bottles were made of this classy organic blend, from a small area of vineyards planted in 1997. It's a weighty, full-bodied style of rosé with firm, dark fruit, a ripe tropical edge, and great acidity to refresh the palate. A top food wine with lovely texture. You can do some spicy asian cuisine with this one and it won't take anything away from this wine's big taste.

AARP MA FRAUD WATCH **UPDATE**



BACKGROUND:

Did you know that someone's identity gets stolen every two seconds? The AARP Fraud Watch Network provides you with tips and resources to help you spot and avoid identity theft and fraud so you can protect yourself and your family. Our watchdog alerts will keep you up to date on con artists' latest tricks. It's free of charge for everyone: AARP members, nonmembers, and people of all ages. The AARP Fraud Watch Network is: • An Educator: Get real-time alerts about the latest scams, tips on how to spot them, and the inside scoop on how con artists think so you can outsmart them before they strike.

- A Watchdog: Our nationwide scam tracking map gives you access to a network of people who've spotted scams and the opportunity to pass along your own experiences, so together we can beat con artists at their own game.
- A Resource: Get connected to a real live person trained in how to avoid fraud and advise you if you or a loved one has been scammed by calling our fraud hotline or attending a forum in your community.
- Free for Everyone: Anyone, of any age, can access our resources at no cost.

SCAM ALERT #1:

Last year, the federal government entered into a settlement with Western Union to help recover losses by victims of scams who used Western Union wire transfers. Now scammers are jumping on the refund program to scam more people. Reports to the Federal Trade Commission indicate that consumers are receiving official-looking emails about the program, asking for transaction information and your name and address. These emails are scams - you cannot submit a claim by email. For information about the refund process, visit www.ftc.gov/wu. Claims are due by May 31, 2018.

SCAM ALERT #2:

Getting calls from debt collectors? They might be fake if the person is

trying to collect on a loan you don't recognize, asks you for sensitive information, or uses threats to try to scare you into paying. Tell the caller you won't discuss the debt unless they provide a written notice that includes the debt amount, the name of the creditor, and your rights under the federal Fair Debt Collections Practices Act. Never give out or confirm personal financial or other sensitive information unless you know who you're talking to. If the debt is legitimate, the debt collector will honor your request to follow up in writing. If the calls persist, contact your creditor directly.

SCAM ALERT #3:

Fake checks are featured in many types of scams, from phony prize winnings to bogus jobs. Scammers are good at making their bad checks look legitimate. The scams typically involve sending victims a check to cover a "processing fee" or similar "service", asking them to deposit it, and then when cleared, asking them to immediately wire the money to a third party. Remember, a check can take weeks to clear. Wait until you are certain, and the bank can confirm, that your check has cleared before taking further action. If you wire money from your account and later discover that the original check was fake, you'll have lost the money.

SCAM ALERT #4:

DEADLINE APPROACHING!

You only have until May 31st to make a claim if you were tricked into wiring money to scammers using Western Union. Remember, you may be eligible to get at least some of your money back. If you sent money through Western Union between January 1, 2004 and January 19, 2017, and lost it to a scammer, you may be eligible for a refund. Visit www.ftc. gov/wu to learn more. You can file your petition online or by mail but do so by the deadline of May 31, 2018.

SCAM ALERT #5:

When you see a local phone number pop up on your caller ID, it's tempting to answer. Even though you don't quite recognize the number, the area code and even the first three numbers may appear to be from your town. That's what scammers are banking on. Technology allows them to "spoof" numbers to make them look familiar so you will be more likely to answer the call. Many people are choosing to play it safe and let an unknown number, even one that appears to be local, go to voice mail.

Be a fraud fighter! If you can spot a scam, you can stop a scam. Report scams to local law enforcement. Contact the AARP Fraud Watch Network at www.aarp.org/ fraudwatchnetwork for more information on fraud prevention.

You cannot register on line as we don't want this personal information about the kids online. Registration for the fall season will be held the week of May 7, 8, 9, 10, 11, 1nd 12 from 6:00 pm to 8:00 pm and 9:00 am to 12 noon on Saturday, the 12th at Curley Recreation Center on Day Boulevard (L Street Bath House) in the senior's card room.

Children from age 3 and up to 12 are invited to register now for the fall program. A new division of 3 and 4 year olds has been added. Age group's birth years for the 2018 season are as follows as of September first:

This week, Danny shared his thoughts on Tom Brady's bizarre offseason:

henever Tom Brady is speaking to Jim Gray, it feels like a must-listen.

Well, Brady spoke to Gray earlier this week in front of a live audience at the Milken Institute, and stole the spotlight from the Boston Bruins and Boston Celtics playoff runs for just a moment.

Why? Because Brady continued his strange offseason with a cryptic tone, praising Bill Belichick and the Patriots organization, while, at the same time, letting it be known that he doesn't really feel appreciated by them. Brady provided ammo for people who want to criticize him, and he provided ammo for people who want to support him. On Monday night, Gray asked him, "Do you feel appreciated by [Belichick

and Robert Kraft], and do they have the appropriate gratitude for what you have achieved?" Ok, hold up, hold up, hold up. Before I go any further, there's no denying that Brady wanted him to ask this specific question, right? Like, Brady wrote this question down on a piece of paper before the interview and said, "Jim, whatever you do, make sure you bring this up." That's basically how it went down, no?

Anyways, Brady answered the question by joking, "I plead the Fifth." As in, the Fifth Amendment, which protects one from any form of self-incrimination. Again, it was a joke, kind of. Brady gave an awkward laugh, paused for a moment, and then continued, "Man, that is a tough question." No, it's not. Especially if you still function under The Patriot Way.

In Foxboro, are there ever any "tough" questions from the media? Not when you practice the art of general response. The Patriots have a way with words when talking to the media. But it's on purpose.
